Over its 17-year history, Restore has touched hundreds of urban kids. Some died before they really ever lived. Others aged out and drifted away. Yet others grew into productive adults. And, increasingly, more and more graduate from high school and pusue higher education.

What separates those who "make it" from those

barely treading water or who drown is a mix of character traits, almost always including determination.

Most of us learn about determination through role models. In the

twentieth century, young people were routinely exposed to "The Little Engine That Could," a story made popular by lawyer Arnold Munk (aka Watty Piper).

We were inspired by the Little Engine's mantra, "I Think I Can, I...Think...I...Can!" Through this tale, we learned to take on challenges, even when they appear overwhelming to others.

Restore has been cultivating young people to serve as exemplars of determination. With donors' help, Restore has provided several youth with scholarships to nonpublic schools that require daily homework and serious effort.

In addition, we have encouraged others to "step it up" by entering the school district's college prep academies or by excelling in its theme schools. The result is that Restore has more and more kids who are determined to succeed.

Indifference is an enemy we battle at Restore. The tide of this war shifts often.

Determined to graduate from competitive colleges, they are touring campuses and applying for pre-college summer programs and internships.

They follow in the footsteps of Newton, Nanci and Sheedy, who enter four-year colleges this fall and of Emanuel and Henry, who have just completed a college year.

Next in line are Rafael and Trevon, who are respectively, rising juniors at Union Catholic and at St. Benedict's Prep.

Lessons in determination begin at birth. We rehearse at our parents' feet, doggedly trying to stand, exuberantly forming first words. Later, we stick it out in the sand box and stifle a kindergarten tear. Determined to succeed, we swing through space, leap an abyss, balance on a bike, raise a tremulous hand, ask for a date, drive a car, take the SAT, apply to college, risk intimacy, seek independence, dare to parent. Sadly, some of us do not. Our journey is made easier by loving, encouraging, demanding, understanding adults and by faith.
